A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

YOU ARE HERE

2026 is a year of milestones. We are marking 10 years since the Colson Center began operating as an independent organization, and 35 years since Chuck Colson launched *Breakpoint*, the daily commentary on the culture. It is also the 50-year anniversary of Prison Fellowship, the ministry within which Chuck originally founded the Colson Center.

And of course, this is the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, the document that founded our nation. Each of these dates remind us that God works throughout generations, in people and in institutions, as He brings history to its fulfillment. Just as He was faithful to those who have gone before us, He has faithfully built the Colson Center and used our resources, programs, and projects to equip His people.

Since its founding, over 9,000 *Breakpoint* commentaries have been written, recorded, and published—equipping families, students, schools, and churches to make sense of culture from a Christian worldview. Over 40,000 educators have been trained in Christian worldview, each reaching hundreds of students during their careers. Thirty-six Christians have been recognized

with the William Wilberforce Award for their courageous faith. Over 6,000 men and women have been formed in a holistic Christian worldview, commissioned as Colson Fellows, and are living out their faith with courage where God has called them.

This year, as a way of taking stock of God’s faithfulness and committing again to the mission He has given us, the Colson Center has adopted the phrase “You Are Here.” It is the theme of the 2026 Colson Center National Conference and a guide for our entire organization. Just as He calls His people to particular times and places in history, we know He has called this organization to this work in this moment.

In fact, there is clear evidence of that calling this past year.

A Look Back at 2025

- In September, *Truth Rising* premiered—the culmination of years of work and partnership with Focus on the Family. By the end of 2025, over 672,000 people viewed the documentary. So far, over 17,000 individuals have registered for the study. It’s clearer than ever: people are hungry for Truth.
- We welcomed more guests than ever before at the 2025 Colson Center National Conference, where over 2,400 men and women gathered as the Church to explore what it means to *be the Church*.
- Over 1,600 men and women enrolled in the 2025-2026 Colson Fellows Program.
- Colson Educators saw a 7% increase in teachers trained and an all-time high of teachers awarded with CEU credits—with over 5,300 CEUs issued. We also saw exponential growth in course enrollment with 8,000 new enrollments and 450 teachers trained at the annual Rooted conference, a partnership with the Association of Christian Schools International.
- Colson Center social media reach increased by 158%, significantly expanding exposure and reaching more people with the ministry’s content.

God used supporters like you to make these accomplishments possible. Thank you for partnering with us in 2025 through your prayers, financial support, and encouragement. You are co-laborers in this good work, and for that I am grateful.

As you read through this report, I pray you are encouraged by the many ways God is at work through the Colson Center. We cannot foresee the challenges and opportunities the next ten years will bring, but we know God has called us to this moment. Our aim is to steward that calling as He enables us to do so.

You are called to this time and place for a purpose, too. As we walk through this milestone year and beyond, I invite you to continue walking with us in equipping Christians in this civilizational moment.

EQUIPPED TO LEAD IN THIS CULTURAL MOMENT

Just weeks before stepping into his role as President of Liberty University in 2023, Dr. Dondi Costin was commissioned as a Colson Fellow.

At a pivotal moment—preparing to lead one of the largest Christian universities in the world—he completed a year of rigorous worldview formation designed to equip Christians to live and lead with clarity, confidence, and courage.

Three years later, Dr. Costin reflects on how the Colson Fellows Program continues to shape both his faith and his leadership.

At your commissioning in 2023, you offered an oath to the new Colson Fellows. Can you share what was on your heart as you stood before your fellow believers and classmates that day?

As a career military officer, it's fair to say there are few greater honors than officiating the commissioning ceremony of another officer. ... Importantly, an officer's commissioning ceremony culminates a rigorous program of preparation for what lies ahead, and the analogy for a Colson Fellows commissioning is obvious to anyone who has ever run that race. The commissioning is in one sense a conclusion of what has gone before but is in the best sense a commencement of what is to come. Standing on the Colson Center stage as a new Colson Fellow, having been granted the honor of administering an oath to my colleagues and likening it to our responsibilities in keeping with The Great Commission, caused my worlds to collide in the best of ways. I will never forget that moment and remain forever grateful for that opportunity.

The Colson Fellows Program emphasizes integrating a Christian worldview—Creation, Fall, Redemption, and Restoration—into every sphere of influence. How did your experience as a Colson Fellow shape you?

The Colson Fellows Program has provided both a mindset and a skillset that God continues to use to conform me to the image of His Son. As a former industrial engineer, I'm a systems guy, so getting clarity on what we mean by biblical worldview and being taught each component of it gave me a holistic understanding of the Christian worldview and how the whole story fits together. As a result, I not only think more clearly about the Christian worldview, but I also articulate it more faithfully to others. As president of a distinctively Christian higher education institution like Liberty University, being a Colson Fellow impacts me every day in training Champions for Christ to make a real difference in their respective spheres of influence all around the world.

If you were encouraging a potential Fellow, perhaps a young leader or an educator, what would you tell them about why they should consider this program?

To borrow a phrase from Nike, just do it. It is a rigorous program but is worth every second and worth every penny. For expert and novice alike, the Colson Fellows Program will help you think through the major issues of our day in the company of fellow travelers who want to be as faithful and effective as possible in this cultural moment. Trust me when I tell you that being a Colson Fellow will pay huge dividends for the rest of your life. Just do it!

Dr. Costin's experience is a powerful reminder that Christian worldview formation does not end at commissioning—it multiplies through leadership. Because one leader was formed, thousands of students are influenced. Because one president was equipped, an institution is strengthened.

This is the ripple effect of formation. It begins personally, but it never remains private. And through your partnership, leaders like Dr. Costin are being formed for influence that will shape the next generation.

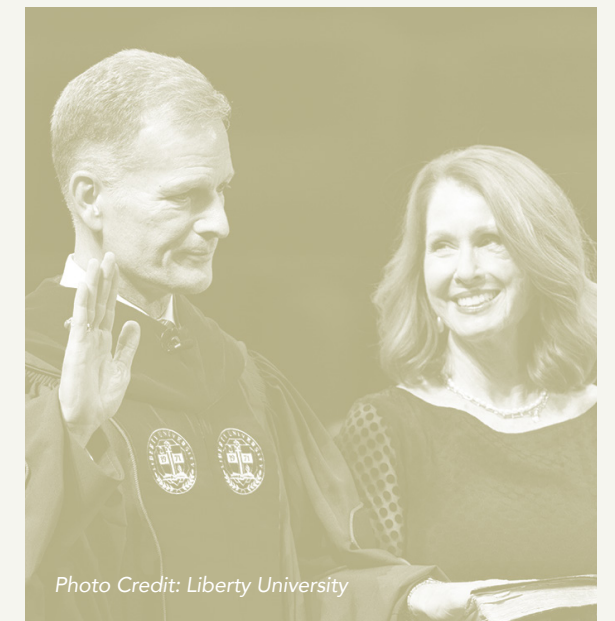

A FAITH REAWAKENED

Mark Dilley is a Colson Fellow from the Class of 2025. His story proves that as long as you have breath in your lungs, it's never too late for Christ to transform your faith.

Mark came to Christ in college, but, as he puts it, “[I] spent the better part of my life creating idols to place in front of me instead of Jesus Christ.”

As he approached his 70s, Mark was looking for something to challenge his intellect and curiosity, when God led him to the Colson Fellows Program: “Somehow Colson Fellows showed up in my inbox. I investigated and enrolled.”

His journey through the program was anything but easy—he underwent three operations, including open-heart surgery that required a month in the hospital and even more time in recovery.

Despite these challenges, Mark was commissioned in 2025. As he walked through the program, he was struck by the devotion of his fellow cohort members and their desire to walk with Christ and live out the kind of faith that makes a difference. Through the reading, he encountered authors like C.S. Lewis, Glenn Sunshine, and Carl Trueman.

As a result of his time in the program, Mark found his faith transformed and enlivened:

“*The impact on my life is so much more than a Christian worldview; it is how to live daily as a follower of Christ to impact those around you, for them to see what redemption and discipleship with Christ is like—much like the early Christians. That is how they changed society.*”

Mark’s advice to anyone considering the program is simple: “If you want to change your walk and become what Christ called us to in Matthew 28:18-20, then please become a Colson Fellow, because it will affect you, your walk, and your Church.”

EQUIPPING THE NEXT Generation to Think Clearly

Lauren Grenier is a middle-school English teacher and a Colson Fellow from the Class of 2025.

Before participating in the program, Lauren noticed a lack of engagement from many of her students when she integrated Scripture into her classroom: “Their eyes would just glaze over. As soon as I brought up Jesus, Scripture, or any sort of biblical integration, they were resistant.”

Not only did the Colson Fellows Program strengthen Lauren in the Christian worldview, but it also gave her practical resources to help challenge and form her students’ worldview.

“*The Cultural Flashpoints portion of the Program was huge, because I’m seeing these flashpoints play out in front of me. It’s been very helpful to have more resources in my bag to respond to things like progressive Christianity, deconstruction, and moralistic therapeutic deism.*”

I appreciated that the program addressed topics the Church is far behind on, like IVF and children’s rights. I’d share Breakpoint articles with my students and say, “Talk to me about what you think.” One day I shared a Breakpoint about an MIT study on ‘bodyoids.’ The students told me, “This is like The Giver!” I said, “Talk to me about IVF. There are all these embryos frozen in clinics and going across the border with no accountability.” My students’ jaws were on the floor.

Having these deep, substantive conversations was incredible. You could almost see the scales falling from their eyes. Their initial reaction was typically fear, but then curiosity. These really profound questions were coming from kids with no filter, which was amazing.”

The program also transformed Lauren beyond her teaching career. For her personal mission plan, the Lord led her and her husband to work toward starting a retreat center for Christian ministry workers:

“*Too many Christian laypeople never get rest. As a culture, we’ve thrown out the Sabbath. Volunteers are being stretched thin, and burnout rates are skyrocketing.*”

The Lord dropped this vision on us, and he orchestrated everything perfectly. The plan is to build a retreat center with housing for Christian ministry workers of any kind. They’ll have space to ask God, “What do You want me to do? How do You want me to participate with You in restoring this world?”

As Lauren and her husband live out their personal mission plan, they are fulfilling the oath that Colson Fellows recite upon their commissioning: “In my sphere of influence where there is good, I will celebrate it. Where there is evil, I will do my best, with God’s help, to eradicate it. Where there is something missing, I will labor to the best of my ability to generate it. And where there is something broken, I will recalibrate it.”

BUILDING A WORLDVIEW-STRONG CAMPUS

After completing the Colson Fellows Program in 2024, Dr. Chris Hobbs wanted to bring the same kind of deep worldview formation to his faculty and staff.

The worldview formation of teachers matters because of the unprecedented challenges facing students today. According to Dr. Hobbs,

“

Students are facing unique challenges related to massive shifts in society. ... They're being raised in a world that we were not raised in. It's not something to be fearful of—God ordained for us to be here at this time to extend His Kingdom and help shape the culture accordingly. But if you don't think about it carefully and critically, it is very disorienting to help walk kids through a life and an experience that many of us didn't have.

Our teachers need to be formed to understand what's deep down under the surface—the difference between reacting to what we're seeing in culture versus proactively shaping culture—and that requires enormous critical thinking.”

As Head of School, Dr. Hobbs feels an intense responsibility—like many Christian school leaders today—to make sure his faculty have a solid Christian worldview:

“

In unclear times, clarity is incredibly valuable. For Christian schools to continue to thrive in this cultural moment, they must get clearer on the most important things. And I think the most important thing is, “How are we forming the biblical worldview of the students in our hallways?” Colson Educators is a really effective way to answer that question.”

Last year, Dr. Hobbs invited Billy Hutchinson, Director of Colson Educators, to do a staff training workshop at Indian Rocks Christian School. This year, over 60 of the Indian Rocks staff have made use of Colson Educators materials, and six are participating in the Colson Fellows Program. Moreover, Dr. Hobbs is exploring the option of launching an Academic Affiliate Program at his school, so his staff can continue to invest in transformational worldview training as a team—right on campus.

As Dr. Hobbs told us, “Colson Educators has cleared the way so that Christian educators can walk the path of forming biblical worldview on their campuses as efficiently as it can be done.”

Because of your generosity, leaders like Dr. Hobbs are equipping teachers to form students with clarity, confidence, and courage in today's culture. Thank you for helping make this kind of transformational worldview training possible in schools across the country.

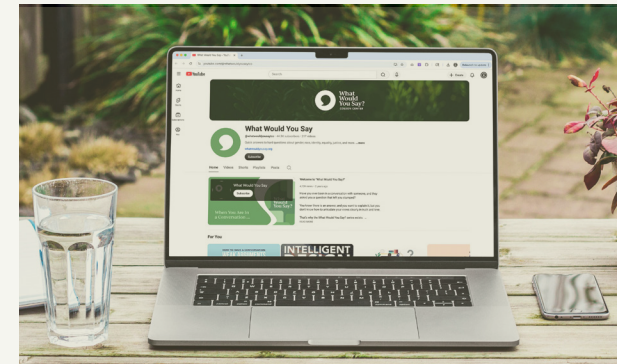

2025 WILBERFORCE AWARD

The William Wilberforce Award honors modern Christians who live out a courageous, sacrificial faith in the spirit of William Wilberforce—whose life demonstrated how biblical conviction can transform culture. In 2025, this award was given to Dr. Ananthi Jebasingh, founder of Good Samaritan Schools in New Delhi.

What began in 1989 with one hungry child at her door became a lifelong calling to serve children no one else would receive. Starting in a slum toilet complex, Dr. Jebasingh built a school rooted in dignity, faith, and love.

Today, Good Samaritan Schools provide education, nutrition, and medical care to more than 1,000 children, with 2,400+ graduates and 2,500 currently enrolled across campuses. Known locally as “Mummy-ji” (“honored mother”), Dr. Jebasingh is honored not only for her vision, but for her prayerfulness, hospitality, and steadfast trust in God.

Dr. Jebasingh’s life and obedience demonstrate what it looks like to restore what’s broken, promote what’s good, and provide what is lacking. For these reasons and more, we were honored to recognize her with the 2025 William Wilberforce Award.

RESTORING WHAT IT MEANS TO BE HUMAN



an interview with:
Dr. Jennifer Patterson
*Executive Director at the Colson Center's

We're living through a time of growing confusion about what it means to be human—from relationships mediated by screens rather than embodied presence, to the belief that biological sex can change to match an internal feeling; from claims of AI surpassing human intelligence to a crisis of meaninglessness among youth. In light of this confusion, the Colson Center is investing in a long-term vision to restore biblical clarity about what it means to be human. That is why we are eager to launch the Institute for Christian Anthropology. In this interview, Dr. Jennifer Patterson, executive director of the Institute, shares how this work builds on the Identity Project (IDP) and equips Christians to live faithfully in this cultural moment.

You're stepping into leadership of the Institute for Christian Anthropology at a pivotal moment. Can you share a little about your background and the journey that led you to this work?

I worked in public policy for decades on issues like education, welfare, and health care. This showed me that our responses to basic needs are shaped by our views of what it means to be human. For example, there's a tendency to treat poverty as a merely material problem, but that ignores relational breakdown that prevents the flourishing for which we were designed as God's image bearers. Recovering sight of this

design has grown even more challenging because of legal and policy decisions to redefine marriage and biological sex, denying created realities.

Of course, the challenge goes much deeper than public policy. To reflect more on these questions, I pursued theological study and focused on the doctrine of the image of God. Building on the coalition work I've done in the public policy sphere, my efforts with the Institute will gather scholars and leaders to develop resources and consensus about restoring what it means to live as image bearers.

Many of our supporters are familiar with the Identity Project. How would you describe The Institute, and how does it build on what IDP started?

So many of the challenges we face in culture today come from confusion about what it means to be human. The Identity Project represents the opening phase of our efforts to address this confusion by delivering tools for parents, pastors, and teachers to help the next generation discover their God-given identity. Now the Institute for Christian Anthropology will deepen the Colson Center's work to restore a biblical vision of what it means to live as God's image bearers.

The Institute for Christian Anthropology is a long-term initiative to help believers address the roots of our generation's questions about the nature and purpose of human beings. We'll focus especially on three areas: embodiment (honoring God with our bodies); technology (sustaining our human future in an age of AI); and meaning (confronting the growing crisis of despair). The initiative will draw on the work of Christian scholars to produce practical resources that shape how we approach our callings to restore clarity in these areas.

Christians have been warning for years that once we untether identity from a biblical understanding of humanity, we would face deep cultural consequences. How are we now seeing those warnings become reality?

One place we see a stark denial of the givenness of human nature is in the false message of transgenderism. It's heartbreaking to hear the regret expressed by detransitioners who acted on that message only to find that it didn't offer the peace they sought.

Technology—especially AI—is advancing rapidly. What does it look like to “sustain our human future” in this kind of technological age?

The challenges that we face because of rapidly advancing technology remind us that Christianity is not only about what we believe but about how we live in all areas. Beliefs and habits matter. How we engage in technology will shape us. Will we drift toward increased isolation and disembodied interaction with virtual reality, or will we actively pursue a path that critically engages technology and develops it in ways that can serve true human flourishing?

The Institute is described as a “generational project.” What makes this work different from a short-term initiative, and why is a long horizon necessary?

The world around us constantly changes and presents new challenges to what it means to be human. The Institute will work with Christian scholars to address gaps and emerging challenges on an ongoing basis. The goal of the resources produced by the Institute is to equip Christians to pursue their callings in ways that restore clarity in their spheres of influence about what it means to be human. Seeking this kind of renewal in a school or a business, for example, is not a solitary endeavor but requires concerted, long-term effort.

For ministry partners who have invested in this work, what kind of long-term impact do you pray future generations of Christians will experience because of the Institute for Christian Anthropology?

One of the reasons I'm excited to join the Colson Center is because the ministry equips Christians to put faith into practice in all areas of their lives. By God's grace, that has ripple effects that move through families, communities, and generations.

I am grateful for our ministry partners who make this work possible, and I look forward to sharing more about this initiative in the coming year.

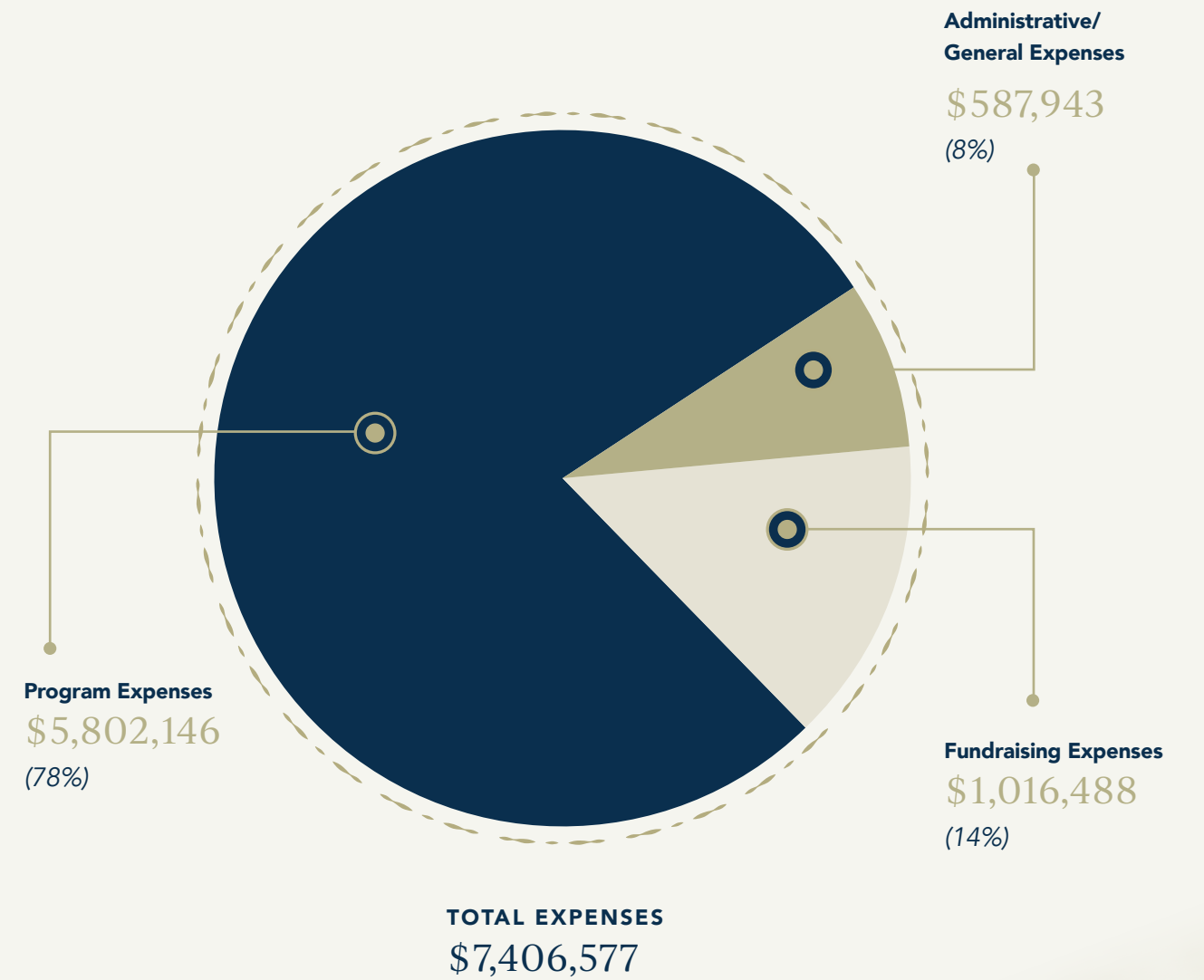
